

The Beginner's Guide to AI Tools

Beyond ChatGPT

If the only AI tool you've ever opened is ChatGPT, you've seen one corner of a much bigger room. This guide is a map of the rest of it.

Most people who use AI ask the same question: “which AI should I use?” That question doesn't really have an answer, because there is no single best AI. These tools are specialists, not generalists - each one was built to be exceptional at a narrow set of things. The people and businesses getting real value out of AI have stopped looking for one tool to rule everything. They ask a different question instead: “what am I actually trying to do right now?” - and then they open the tool built for that job.

This guide introduces the tools worth knowing beyond the familiar chat box: what each one is genuinely good at, where it falls short, and how to start pointing the right tool at the right task. None of this requires a technical background - just five minutes and a willingness to try something other than the app you already have open.

The Big Six - Language Models

These are the general-purpose “thinking” tools - you type or talk to them, and they respond. ChatGPT is the one almost everyone has tried. The other five each beat it at something specific.

ChatGPT (OpenAI) · *General all-rounder*

The familiar baseline - fast, capable, and genuinely good for everyday drafting, brainstorming, and quick questions. It's the one most people already know, which is exactly why it's easy to stop here.

Best for: A solid starting point for almost anything - but often outperformed by a specialist once the task gets deeper, longer, or more nuanced.

Claude (Anthropic) · *Long documents & nuance*

Handles very large documents - full contracts, reports, research papers, entire data exports - without losing track of what came before. It also tends to write with a more careful, human tone than most alternatives.

Best for: Reading and summarising long documents, and any writing where precision, tone, and nuance actually matter - emails, proposals, reports, anything client-facing.

Gemini (Google) · *Google ecosystem & live search*

Built directly into Google Docs, Sheets, Gmail, and Drive, and connected to live Google search results rather than a fixed training cutoff.

Best for: Anyone whose work already lives inside Google's tools, or who needs current, sourced information pulled from the live web.

Grok (xAI / X) · *Real-time & direct*

Lives inside X (formerly Twitter), with live access to whatever is trending right now - news, markets, public sentiment, as it happens.

Best for: A real-time pulse check on a topic, company, or industry conversation as it's actually unfolding, not as it was written up afterward.

◆ DeepSeek · *Technical reasoning*

A model built in China with exceptional performance on logic, maths, and coding - and it's available at a fraction of the cost of most competitors.

Best for: Structured problem-solving and anything technical - coding, calculations, step-by-step analysis - where raw reasoning power matters more than writing style.

🔍 Perplexity · *Research with sources*

Not really a chatbot - more of a research engine. Every answer comes with live citations pulled straight from the web, so you can check exactly where it came from.

Best for: Anything where you need to trust the answer: research before a big decision, background-checking a company, or fact-checking before you rely on something in public.

Visual & Creative - Image and Video

Language models write text. A different family of tools generates images and video directly from a written description - no design or editing software required.

🖼️ Owen (Alibaba) · *Image generation*

Alibaba's model is strong at both text and image generation, turning a written description into a finished visual in seconds.

Best for: Website imagery, social media graphics, concept visuals, and illustrations - no design skills needed to get a usable result.

🎬 Luma Ray 3 · *Video generation*

A state-of-the-art text-to-video and image-to-video model. It turns a written description - or a still image - into a short, cinematic moving clip.

Best for: A product teaser, concept animation, or a visual for a presentation - without a video production budget or crew.

Two Tools Worth Knowing - For When You're Ready to Go Further

★ Claude.ai - with a free account · *Free to start*

Using any AI tool without an account is like renting a hotel room - it's reset every time you leave. Create a free Claude account and it remembers what you told it last week, lets you upload full documents, and keeps ongoing projects organised in one place. Perplexity works the same way with an account - your research history stays intact instead of disappearing.

Best for: Anyone doing repeated or ongoing work with AI - not just a one-off question.

⚙️ Claude Code - AI that writes and runs code · *For the curious*

Claude Code is a tool where the AI doesn't just suggest code - it writes it, runs it, edits files, and builds entire small applications, working through a task step by step. You don't need to know how to code to direct it; you describe what you want in plain language. Think of it as a developer that works at the speed of thought - useful for automating repetitive tasks, building a simple internal tool, or processing data at scale.

Best for: Anyone with a repetitive manual process, a spreadsheet nightmare, or an idea for a small tool - and no budget for a custom development project.

The Mindset Shift

Someone who uses Perplexity for research, Claude for important documents, Gemini for their Google-based work, and Qwen for a quick image is operating at a different level than someone who opens ChatGPT for everything and stops there. Almost all of these tools are free or nearly free to try. The real question was never which one is “best” - it's which one you should open first for the task in front of you.

Start with Claude.ai - create a free account and upload a document you're already working on. That one step is usually the fastest way to feel the difference between an AI you talk to and an AI you actually work with.

Beyond the free guide

Knowing which tool to open is the first step.
